### Exercise Back in the 1930's

Diet and Exercise were accepted as a combination to maintain health and to have fun. The truly chic women would seek out resorts and health farms. It was seen as another sort of private party for those who participated in

prescribed exercise routines. Tennis was among the sports women took part in. Women were finally playing Tennis with their bare legs showing. Mrs. Fearnley-Whittingstall was the first to start this trend playing at Forest Hills, New York. She wore socks, a pleaded skirt, and short sweater. This look was immediately copied for the alternate, garters and corsets, were too restrictive. Shorts came about as a rebuttal against the 20's fashions, which became tedious at this time.

Resort wear became sophisticated and relaxed. Designers worked with

huge wide trousers, backless tops, big hats, and espadrilles (casual sandals originating from the Pyrenees) to replace peasant clothing. Tennis whites and shorts were fun for cycling and relaxation. Swimsuits were formal in highlighting the social aspect of leisurewear, and were ideal dress for yachts. Costume jewelry was still lavish when paired with casual clothing.

The rich viewed exercise as a passion, but also a necessity. Averell Harriman opened Sun Valley, a new ski resort that attracted film stars and famous people of the day. Everyone wanted to be seen there, especially in the photo opportunities at the hot tubs and club lounge. Women started to take up many sports to maintain their figure and get outdoors. Ice skating, fencing, cycling, and tap dance were a few of the sports women participated in. For the serious athlete track and field, polo, and gymnasium exercises were popular activities.

Trousers were a big feature of the 30's in which they were worn for sport, casual wear, and for work. Katharine Hepburn was known for her masculine style in easy, plain fabrics. This was the foundation for American sportswear, which was casual wear. Barbara Stanwyck, and others from western films, began to wear jeans. Those who

could risk a lack of formality took part in this fashion revolution, but it was still reserved for people from Texas and those on the film set.



Tampax was invented in the 30's, but it was not widely used until the 1950's for it was seen as not suitable for nice girls. It provided immense freedom for those dedicated to sport or aesthetic appearance. The 1930's was an era of beginnings for women in sport and products to enhance performance. Although women of the time did not know it then, they paved the way for women of today to participate with freedom and easy of enjoyment in sport and life. Our gratitude is forever given for this!

## Gone to the Dogs

Jack and Jill went up the hill to fetch a pail of water . . . NO NO NO — the truth is much more interesting:

Jack Green and Steve Owsley gathered up their dogs Prince & Bandit and fetched Bruce Baird's 1931 Slant Windshield for a weekend get away to the central valley. Off they went, Steve and Jack in the front, Prince and Bandit in the back, following behind Walter Caplan and Bruce in Walter's A, headed to Campo Seco for "A" Day at the Ranch. The caravan traveled up I-80 to Highway 4, then on to Stockton, briefly stopping at Tom and Terry Machado's for coffee, then on to Campo Seco.

Doug Hardy's ranch is a Gold Rush era farmhouse in Campo Seco, a once thriving mining town, first prospected by Mexican miners in 1849. By the following year quite a camp had grown up around them. It was due to the severe scarcity of water that the place got its name,

Campo Seco, meaning "dry camp" in Spanish. Forty different nationalities were represented among the miners of Campo Seco during the early years, making it perhaps the most cosmopolitan of all the mining camps in the Gold Country. Today, little remains of this once thriving community, except a few houses and some stone ruins. "A" Day provided a gathering spot and picnic lunch with 50 cars, the majority being Model A's.

The dogs traveled well the entire trip – they had the best seats, plenty of fresh air, and a great view from the side and rear windows. They saw everything and everyone, and

everyone saw them with their big heads protruding out the open windows. They are big dogs (except when describing them to the hotel reservation clerk over the phone). Mid-afternoon Prince and Bandit checked into the luxurious Comfort Inn in Lodi – they were ready for a nap, as were we all. It was time for some much needed rest and relaxation - before joining the Machados as their guests at a Saturday night banquet dinner hosted by the Mother Lode Branch of the Antique Automobile Club of America.

Sunday morning the AACA hosted a tour of a member Leroy Gatto's 6000 sq. foot garage, where we viewed his in-progress restoration of a 1920's era Rolls Royce Sedan Delivery. It was a very interesting tour. The Rolls had just been fitted with a new wood body and the exposed restored mechanicals were amazing to look at.

From there, Prince and Bandit traveled with us to Micke Grove Regional Park in Lodi, where the Early Ford V8 Club had a car show and barbecue picnic. What a bunch of fun cars and nice people. The Machados really knocked themselves out, preparing and serving a barbeque feast for their car club friends and us guests.

The scenery along the way was beautiful, especially from the windows of the Model A's. If you don't believe us, just ask the dogs. They surprised many people traveling in cars along the way, especially with Prince sticking his head out the side windows. Any apprehension we had about traveling with the dogs was soon dispelled. They were well received by all and had lots of opportunities to run around, though Prince wasn't quite sure what to make of the horses and mules he met at Campo Seco.

The driving was fun, except for Steve when it got windy,

notably on the Delta levee road and the Bay Bridge on the return trip. Some of the merges on the freeway could be nerve rattling; the brakes are decent, but not great like a modern car. We got blown around pretty good on the Bay Bridge. That part wasn't too much fun! Steve learned really quick to SLOW DOWN if the handling got the least bit uncomfortable. Sometimes even that wasn't enough, with the wind and uneven levee road. It's interesting to note that the speeds Caltrans posts on curves are in fact safe speeds for a Model A. That's why they seem a little slow for a modern car.

Traveling through Oakland on Highway 24 as it merges into I-580 before the Bay bridge on the return was by far the worst leg of the trip. A Model A isn't well suited for urban freeway driving on a Sunday late afternoon when everyone is rushing to get back home from their Sunday excursion - - and how do we know, because there were a few tense moments in traffic getting to and across the Bay Bridge when coming back home.

All in all, the dogs told us that weekend getaways in the Model A's make the drudgery of the work week tolerable. Prince and Bandit insist on a minimum of one weekend outing each month in the A's. They say that it's what makes a dog's life worth living.

Hats off to the Bob Craigs who got the A's ready for the tour. No mechanical problems, no people problems, no domestic problems, no dog problems.

## Technical Tip

Little things have a way of creating problems. A gas cap that does not vent can create havoc. If your car runs for a short time and acts like it is not getting gas, take the cap off and see if the car runs properly. It is also possible for the gas line to be blocked by rust or an after market filter restricting fuel flow. Check the easy things first.

Jackson Rancheria Casino is about 10 miles away. Anyone who is interested should put this date on their calendar. More information will appear in the July **Choke Rod**.






