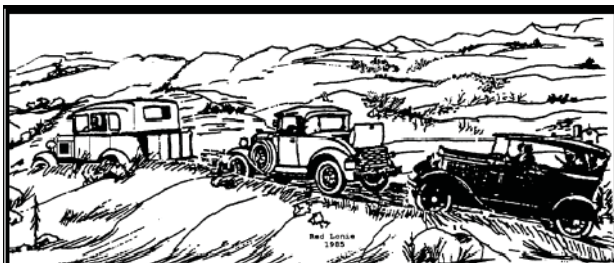

War!

Head of the National Socialist (Nazi) party, Adolph Hitler had ruled Germany since 1933. He told the German people that he would build Germany into a mighty empire. He told his soliders, "Close your eyes to pity! Act brutally!" In March 1938 Hitler's troops crossed the Austrian border and took over Austria. In September 1938 they took over Sudetenland, a part of Czechoslovakia. By March 1939, they had taken over the rest of Czechoslovakia. "Conquest is not only a right but a duty," Hilter said.

Some people spoke out against Hilter, but they were not strong enough to stop him. Hilter's secret police, the Gestapo, destroyed anyone who opposed him. In 1933 the first concentration camp was built at Dachau, Germany. Others were built as Hilter escalated his efforts to eliminate anyone he considered undesirable. Gypsies, communists, gay men, lesbians, people with mental or physical disabilities, and millions of Jews were sent to concentration camps.

Outside of Germany the leaders of France and Great Britain thought they could appease Hitler by letting him take some territory, hoping that would satisfy him. Leaders of other countries, such as Benito Mussolini, the dictator of Italy, signed treaties of friendship with Hitler. The military leaders of Japan did as well. On August 24, 1939 Russia signed a nonaggression treaty with Germany that shocked the world. The two countries agreed to "refrain from every act of force, every aggressive action, and every attack against each one another."

At dawn on September 1, 1939, German troops, tanks, and aircraft attacked Poland, the country that lay between Russia and Germany. Great Britain and France warned Hitler that they would go to war if he didn't withdraw his troops. Hitler ignored them and Great Britain and France declared war on Germany on September 3, officially starting the World War II.

America was determined to stay out of the fighting. World War I had left most Americans disillusioned about war. They had fought that war believing it was the war to end all wars, but now another one was raging. Americans had also been disillusioned when they found out a Senate investigation revealed that many businessmen had made huge sums of money off the war. These people were labeled "merchants of death."

The United States was still recovering from the Great Depression, which had left millions of Americans

struggling to find jobs, food, and housing. War news was everywhere, in newsreels at the movies theaters, photographs in magazines (like Life), and on the radio with bombs whistling in the background.

In 1940 Hitler added more countries to his list-Norway, Denmark, Luxembourg, Belgium, the Netherlands, and France. German bombers blasted Britain, and German submarines sank huge numbers of ships. Italy and Japan invaded more countries and on June 22, 1941 Germany violated its nonaggression agreement and invaded Russia.

As the war spread the Unites States responded in various ways. In 1940, Congress voted to spend more money for national defense. It also passed the Selective Training and Service Act, which set up a system for drafting men into the armed forces. In March 1941, Congress passed the Lend-Lease Act, which gave the president authority to send weapons, food, and equipment to Great Britain.

On Sunday, December 7, 1941 Japanese dive bombers, torpedo planes, and fighters attacked the U.S. naval base at Pearl Harbor. Caught by surprise, the U.S. fleet was devastated with 2,403 Americans dead, five battleships sank, others severely damaged, and 200 planes destroyed.

The next day congress voted to declare war on Japan. Several days later Germany and Italy declared war on the United States and the United States declared war on Germany and Italy. The United States, Great Britain, France, Russia, and 45 other countries joined together and became known as the Allies. Germany, Japan, Italy, and three other countries became known as the Axis.

Early Ford Wire Wheels

All of these wheels had 5 on 5.5 bolt pattern and about the only other thing they had in common was that they all have a space for a flange inside the bolt pattern circle. This flange or two plane bolt pattern pad was only on mechanical brakes so when using 40-48 or any other brake setup a spacer should be used to give the 1928-35 wheel support on the inside of the bolt pattern, but many people don't and they usually seem to be OK. But you should definitely not use newer Ford wheels on mechanical brakes.



28-29s are 21"x3" wheels with welded spokes. As you can see the top spokes are straight lace and the bottom spokes are single-cross. They have a rolled bead rim and are prone to cracking on the hub from one of the bottom spokes to the bottom or back of the hub.

30-31s are pretty much the same thing as 28-29s except for they are a 19"x3" wheel with a normal bead rim called knife edge. Same pattern for spokes, cracks in the same place and welded. These are 18"x3 1/4" wheels with welded spokes. The spokes are single cross on top and bottom. Hubcap hole size is 5 3/4, as is the rest of the wheels mentioned here forward. Unlike the two Model A wheels the lugnuts on these are covered by the hubcap.



32s are 18"x3-1/4" wheels with welded spokes. The spokes are single cross on top and bottom. Hubcap hole size is 5 3/4, as is the rest of the wheels mentioned here forward. Unlike the two Model A wheels the lugnuts on these are covered by the hubcap.

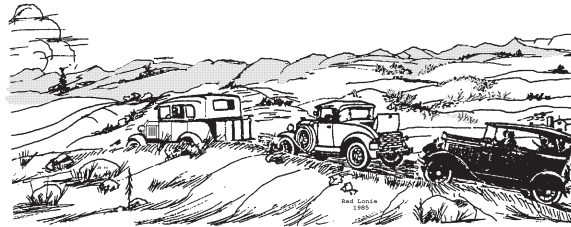
This 34 is a 17"x3 1/4" rim that is pretty much the same as 32s.



Same as 32-34 wheels but they're 16"x4" These are by far the most plentiful because back in the war years, when a car needed new tires, a set of these wheels with new tires could be had for less than a set of 17" or 18" tires because of the price of rubber if you could find them. A good way to tell these apart from 17s and 18s without measuring is the valve stem hole. The 16" has a normal hole in the flat part of the rim, while 17" and 18" have the hole in a humped up area. (see pictures of the 17" and 18")

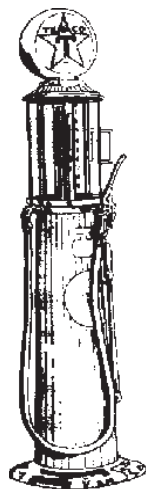


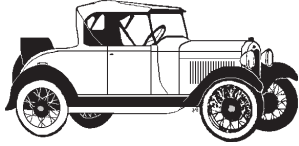
