The Pop Years

1960-1979

The 1960's saw everything from beatniks to go-go dancers to hippies, new synthetics to day-glo colors, to an obsession with natural and ethnic fabrics. The 1970's had a succession of browns and suede to jewel-toned disco satin to punk pvc, rips and safety pins. Bra fashions of this time were a reflection of these fashion trends, but comfort was largely important.


There are almost 12 million teenage Baby Boomers in the U.S. Alone. Knowing they had more money to spend than their wartime predecessors, bra manufacturers began to target the teen market with adverts they could relate to offering specially designed teen bras. As a product of the post-war "Baby Boom" there was an unprecedented number of teenagers in the beginning of the 1960's. There was no famine, war, pestilence, disease, or even high unemployment rates for families to worry about. This meant more leisure time to spend that extra money, especially on clothes. Teenagers became an important market in the U.S., spending

\$85 million dollars on bras. Advertisements targeted teens in a variety of ways.

Daisy by Permalift took the instructional approach by asking magazine readers "When Should You Start Wearing a Bra? The advertisement suggests maybe now is not too soon for a Daisy bra, while coaxing young women to tell their mother about them and her to go in with you to a fitting. The ubiquitous Madienform adverts, where women dream they are doing whatever they want while wearing their skivvies provoked the Undertone a bra for teens. Ads were created for this market as were for the adults with bra-clad high school students dreaming of being "wild in the west" or something close to that. The ad offers, "Undertone makes the most of the young figure. Each cup is edged with firm embroidery that holds the bra snug as it shapes and defines your curves."



Mary Quant was the UK's fashion darling associated with the minidress, make-up and undies. Quant recognized teenagers wanted a radically different look than that of their parents and designed the Qform bra for the 1960's youth. It was a demi-cup, push-up bra in a range of shades, decorated with the Mary Quant posy and typifying her simplistic, athletic style.

The Model 'B' Ford

The Model B was a Ford automobile with production starting with model year 1932 and ending with 1934. It was a much updated version of the Model A and was replaced by the 1935 Ford Model 48. Strictly speaking, the Model B was a four-cylinder car with an improved version of the engine used in the Model A, but Ford also began producing a very similar car with Ford's new flathead V-8 engine. The V-8 car was marketed as the Model 18, though it is commonly called the Ford V-8, and, other than the engine, is virtually indistinguishable from the Model B.

Up to this time, Ford had produced only one "model" at each time with range of body options and retained the idea of a single basic platform, despite the engine choice and two associated model designations. (This explains why the colloquial name "Ford V-8" by itself was sufficiently descriptive in the early 1930s; it was the Ford with a V-8, unlike in later decades, when the paradigm of various models to a make became universal.) Model B and Model 18 Fords came in a large variety of body styles: two-door roadster, two-door cabriolet, four-door phaeton, two-door and four-door sedans, four-door "woodie" station wagon, two-door Victoria, two-door convertible sedan, Panel and sedan deliveries, five-window coupe, a sport coupe (stationary softtop) and the three-window Deluxe Coupe. Prices ranged from US\$460 for the roadster and the coupe's \$490 to the \$650 convertible sedan. Production totals numbered from 12,597 for the roadster to 124,101 for the two-door sedan. Nowadays, the roadster and coupe are most sought after, as these body styles are popular for streetrods and intact examples have become rare. As an interesting aside, the parent company designed a scaled down version of this car for Europe. Known as the Model



'Y' (or Y Type Ford) the wheelbase was originally a full 28 inches shorter, rising to 34 inches shorter when the US model was stretched. At this time, the styling changes, including the 'shovel grille' and dipped front bumper, were carried over to the UK made car. It was only

ever available with the flathead 4 cylinder engine. The V-8 didn't make it across the Atlantic until 1947, when it was introduced in the Ford V8 Pilot.


The Model 18 was the first low-priced, mass-marketed car to include a V-8 engine, an important milestone in American automotive history. The V-8 was rated at 65 hp (48 kW) when introduced, but power increased significantly with improvements to the carburetor and ignition in later years. This engine choice was more popular than the four-cylinder, which was essentially a variant of the Model A engine with improvements to balancing and lubrication. In both models the fuel tank was located in the lower rear of the car, as is typical in modern cars, rather than in the cowl as in the Model A and late Model T, requiring Ford to include an engine-driven fuel pump rather than rely on gravity feed.

Today, the 1932 Model B is a highly collectible car that people will pay thousands of dollars to restore to exact original style. During the WWII period the Model Bs and V-8s were frequently altered into hot rods. This continued into the 1960s on a large scale, being noted in popular media of that time via a hit song. Since the 1970s, 1932 bodies and frames have been reproduced either in fiberglass or lately in steel, which has helped resolve bodywork shortages, and increased the number of "rods" being created or restored. Those that are made are often very expensive. A typical auto-show hot rod may be \$60,000 or more.




